The Chairman's Corner



This past November 11, we had our annual Veterans Day luncheon held at the Main Lodge, where we honor not only our Vets here in the Hideout, but we also bus in Vets from the Veterans Hospital in Wilkes-Barre. It is very humbling to see the Vets ushered in on their wheel chairs knowing the sacrifices they each individually made in past wars so that we today can enjoy the freedom that is unique to America. At the Board of Directors table were myself, Directors Marie Krauss, Kellyn Nolan and Rich Straczynski, Wayne County Commissioners Jonathan Fritz and Wendell Kay, our Community Manager Joe Acla and his daughter Theresa, but most importantly, a 91 year old Veteran from WW II.

The ceremony is very inspiring and well organized, sponsored by our very own **Hideout Help a Hero Fund**. The Help a Hero Fund committee is comprised of, Bob Wiegand, Mickey Wiegand, Bill Wagner, Charlie Lawlor and their newest member Ted Rohlfing. This is a grass root organization started here in the Hideout. Here is their story.

In 2004, the 9/11 Committee was formed with the purpose in mind to give The Hideout a 9/11 Memorial Park to honor the victims of that horrific day. After receiving permission from the POA to utilize the land where Reflection Park now stands, they went about designing the Park, raising funds, seeking donations of materials and services and then building the Park, to not only honor the patriots that died that day but also to honor our military who were then called to duty to protect our nation. The bridge from Reflection Park to the military gazebo symbolizes the transition from the Police and Firefighters who bravely sacrificed their lives at Ground Zero to our men and women in the military who still continue the fight.

The Park was dedicated on September 11, 2005 with much fanfare, and they continued fundraising so they could improve the Park and on September 11, 2006 they had the 5th Anniversary rededication. At that rededication, local Police, Firefighters, and EMTs surrounded the Park joining in the ceremony.

On that day, the fund founders were informed that the son of one of the firefighters standing before us was seriously ill, and the Fire Company was holding fundraisers to help with the medical costs. Upon learning of this they decided to form **The Help a Hero Fund** and make a \$1,000 donation to help out the local heroes that are there to help us every day.

Since then they incorporated and received their Charitable Organization Status (C501-3-C) from the IRS. They have continued to raise funds and give back to the community who supports them. Here are some examples of the fund's accomplishments over their first ten years:

- ...they gave us Reflection Park;
- ...provided CPR mannequins for Public Safety to train with;
- ...provided a Rescue Sled to our Ski Patrol to remove injured skiers from the Ski Hill;
- ...purchased AED Trainers and co-sponsored with Public Safety to have AED and CPR training for all members of our community;
- ...purchased and maintains all flags, decorations, and materials for Reflection Park;
- ...they have created and maintain the Veterans Wall of Honor in the Main Lodge;
- ...they host the 9/11, Veterans Day I mentioned above, also a Memorial Day Ceremony, and the brunch that follows each event;
- ...they gave a \$500 Donation to the Honesdale Homeless Veterans Shelter;
- ...they donated the Flag and Flagpole honoring Iraq & Afghanistan Veterans at the Golf Course;
- ...they donated the Flag and Flagpole honoring The Hideout Veterans at Roamingwood Park;
- ...they will be donating the Flagpole dedicated to Purple Heart Recipients at the Main Beach, as soon as the Main Lodge renovation is complete.

They also have put into place a one week, all inclusive vacation, for a wounded veteran and are awaiting their first recipient of the Hideout's "Vacation for Vets" program. And Bob tells me that what they are most proud of is that they have given out more than \$22,000 from their fund to the heroes who have our back every day, when they or their families are in trouble and need of assistance.

All this has been made possible thanks to the generosity and support of the members of the Hideout, along with that of our neighbors and friends, and the very hard work of the five dedicated individuals I mentioned earlier. I hope everyone who reads this is as proud as I am to live in a community that voluntarily gives back to those who have given so much to us.

I wish everyone a happy and safe holiday, and please keep our first responders, those who defend our freedom, especially those who won't be home with their families in your thoughts and prayers.

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Public Safety Corner

At the November 21 Board Meeting, the Board adopted the recommendation from the Public Safety Committee addressing the Public Safety Department Citation Fine Structure.

At the Public Safety Committee meeting held on October 21, the committee discussed the Departments Traffic and Non-Traffic Citation Fine Structure. The discussion was based on the fact that the fine structures have not been addressed in several years, as well as member complaints regarding violations within the community at monthly meetings of the Board of Directors. As a result of the discussion, a new fine structure was approved unanimously by the committee for consideration by the Board of Directors.

The Public Safety Committee believes that the new fine structure will enhance the safety and well being of the community residents, by increasing compliance with the communities Rules & Regulations from members, renters, guests, contractors and invitees. The new fine structure will go into effect on January 1, 2016. The Public Safety Department will continue with the strict enforcement of the Hideout's Rules & Regulations with a concentrated focus on speeding, stop sign and noise violations in order to maintain a safe and peaceful community.

The Public Safety Department is encouraging everyone to please be mindful of our Rules & Regulations in order that all can be safe and enjoy our great community. Below is the new fine structure that will go into effect on January 1.

Public Works Corner

Oh boy! The holidays are upon us and Jack Frost will be nipping at our nose very soon. When that cold air bites at your skin, nothing is better than warming up to a fire while caressing a hot cup of cocoa. Amid all the splendor, it's far too easy for us to get lost in the thrill of the season and lose track of priorities.

The snow will be falling soon and I ask that everyone prohibit from parking vehicles on the road. Also, please pull your personal items back ten feet from the road. The plows will need the extra room to clear the roads.

Please note that unless specified, the trash compactors are only for household garbage. Any bulk items can be dropped off at the Maintenance shop during the posted times.

For those heading south for the winter, make sure your home is properly winterized to prevent the plumbing from freezing.

Here are a few safety tips for the holidays:

- When setting up a tree at home, place it away from fireplaces, radiators or portable heaters. Place the tree out of the way of traffic and do not block doorways.
- Make sure all holiday bulbs work and that there are no frayed wires, broken sockets or loose connections.
- Some light strands may contain lead in the bulb sockets and wire coating, sometimes in high amounts. Make sure your lights are out of reach of young children who might try to mouth them, and wash your hands after handling them.
- Before using lights outdoors, check labels to be sure they have been certified for outdoor use. To hold lights in place,

string them through hooks or insulated staples, not nails or tacks. Never pull or tug lights to remove them.

- Turn off all lights when you go to bed or leave the house. The lights could short out and start a fire.
- Keep potentially poisonous holiday plant decorations, including mistletoe berries, Jerusalem cherry, and holly berry, away from children and animals.
- Children can have serious stomach and intestinal problems – including death – after swallowing button batteries or magnets. Keep button batteries and magnets away from young children and call your health care provider immediately if your child swallows one.
- Remember that the homes you visit may not be childproofed. Keep an eye out for danger spots like unlocked cabinets, unattended purses, accessible cleaning or laundry products, stairways, or hot radiators.
- Remember to buckle up and never allow someone who is under the influence of alcohol to drive.
- Do not burn gift wrap paper in the fireplace. A flash fire may result as wrappings ignite suddenly and burn intensely.
- Take care of yourself – the holidays can be stressful
- Most important of all, enjoy the Holidays for what they are - time to enjoy with your family. So, be a family, do things together like sledding or playing board games, spend time visiting with relatives, neighbors and friends.

Due to continued State budget impasse, we are still waiting on the status of two grant applications that were submitted. The one grant, if approved, will help to address ongoing storm water and erosion problems off of Lakeview Drive West. More to follow.

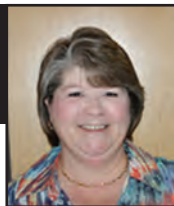
If you are planning any renovation or landscaping projects, please contact the POA, extension 108, or 166, prior to initiating project. We are more than happy to assist and guide you through the planning and permit process.

- Once you receive your permit, **PLEASE** remember to attach it on your address post.
- Please check your existing culvert pipes and swales to make sure that they are clear of leaves and other debris. As you know, the Hideout has heightened its overall planning related to storm water and soil erosion management.
- Please pick up waste from your pets. Pet waste will wash into our culvert drains and eventually our lakes and will increase nutrient load towards enhancing algae and other submerged aquatic plant growth.
- Please be sure to sign and return your permit once the work has been completed.
- **Please do not dispose of leaves in the lakes:** Leaf litter would add additional nutrients and phosphorus to our lakes, which would enhance the growth of submerged aquatic vegetation and algae. You are encouraged to dispose of leaf and small branch material at the trash/recycling facility. Public Works has a container available for leaves and one for small woody branch material up to 6" DBH.

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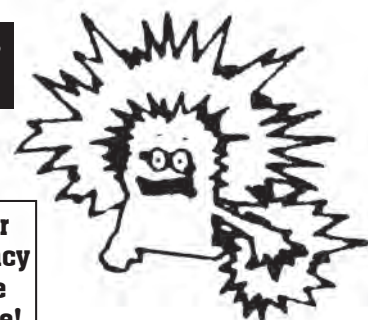
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Fake survey calls want your money, not your opinion

The Federal Trade Commission is investigating automated calls that claim to want your opinion. Actually, what they really want is your money.

You are likely to receive a call because phone surveys are exempt from rules that ban automated "robocalls" and calls to numbers on the National Do Not Call Registry.

Some companies think that beginning an automated sales call with a question makes it legal. It doesn't. One cruise line recently paid a \$500,000 fine to settle claims that it robocalled millions of phone numbers with what seemed to be a political survey. Those who answered were told they could receive a free two-day Bahamas cruise for their trouble. But they were connected to a salesperson who tried to talk them into paying for parts of the "free" cruise. This fake survey has been shut down, but other unscrupulous companies use similar tactics.

Quoted in Bottom Line Personal, Bikram Brandy of the FTC says if someone tries to sell you something during a phone survey, hang up immediately.

If a robocall asks you to press a button on your keypad to be removed from the call list, don't do it. Pressing is likely to increase the number of robocalls you receive. Instead, visit DoNotCall.gov to confirm that your phone number is on the Do Not Call Registry. This will reduce sales calls.

Also, visit Nomorerobo.com to find out if its free robocall-blocking service is available for your landline and/or your mobile phone carrier.

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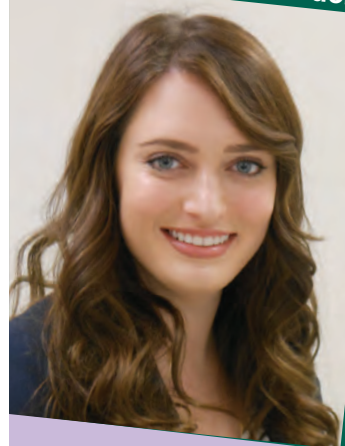


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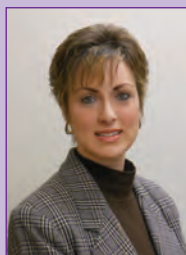

Headaches & Holidays

Like "presents," headaches come in all shapes and sizes! One of the most common types of headache is Muscle Tension Headaches. Neck or jaw problems, poor posture, or things that unfortunately may come with the holiday season, such as fatigue or stress, can cause these. They can last a few hours, days, or even into weeks.

As a physical therapist, I see an increase in patients with headaches around the holidays. It's a time that the body is subjected to many different stresses. From changing normal schedules for shopping, cooking, baking, partying and wrapping gifts- to rushing around during lunch hours, body fatigue and stress affect each person in a different way.

Manual therapy and exercise is a great alternative to medication and other treatments that only give temporary relief.

At physical therapy, following a thorough assessment of the patient, there are three components of treatment:

1. "Hands-On" mobilization of stiff joints, gentle traction techniques and myofascial release of tight muscles. These will begin to restore normal movement and relieve pressure on the structures referring pain to the head.
2. Specific Exercise Program to strengthen weak muscles & stretch the stiff or tight muscles. This allows the patient to maintain the benefit of manual treatment.
3. Postural & Ergonomic Education to identify and correct the cause of the problem.

A few other tips that could help keep your holidays headache-free are: anticipate the stress & pace yourself, eat meals on your regular schedule, limit caffeine, take time to unwind, and as much as possible, keep to your normal daily rhythm. Paying extra attention to your organizational and time management skills can help you to get more enjoyment and less stress out of the holidays!



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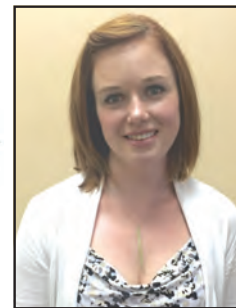


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6 Tips for a Debt-Free Holiday

Is the trick to getting rich just making more money? Expert money managers will admit that having a higher income doesn't hurt. But the real strategy that does work is simply spending less than you make, whatever that income is.

Overspending on holiday shopping is one of the most common mistakes people make in their personal budgeting strategies. Instead of entering this January with a spending hangover, use these tips to keep your holiday budget from exploding.

COMMINGLED RECYCLING

Single stream (also known as "fully commingled" or "single-sort") recycling refers to a system in which all paper fibers, plastics, metals, and other containers are mixed in a collection truck, instead of being sorted by the depositor into separate commodities (newspaper, paperboard, Corrugated fiberboard, plastic, glass, etc.) and handled separately throughout the collection process. In single stream, both the collection and processing systems are designed to handle this fully commingled mixture of recyclables, with materials being separated for reuse at a materials recovery facility.

TREES

What To Do If A Tree Is About To Fall From One Lot To Another?

Even though the Hideout has an easement between properties, this matter is strictly between the parties involved. This includes limbs, branches and trees. If you have this situation, notify the property owner whose property presents the hazard.

The Hideout does not provide information relative to the Membership. You should call the Wayne County Tax Assessment Office at (570) 253-5970 or the internet at taxassessment.officewaynecountypennsylvania.com. You should also contact your insurance company. Another resource is the internet for the purpose of researching Pennsylvania Real Estate Law on the subject. Again, this is a civil matter between the parties involved and cannot be resolved by the Hideout.

Note: In the event that the tree is on Hideout Common Property, the Land & Environmental Planning Manager should be notified so that the appropriate action can be taken to remove the hazard.

PROPANE TANKS

Safety Guidelines For Propane Tanks Homeowners who decide to install a propane tank on their property need to be

aware of the new guidelines for such. A Propane Permit is needed. The National Fire Protection Agency (NFPA) has established a set of rules that govern the requirements for the clearance around propane tanks in the NFPA 58 Liquefied Petroleum Gas Code. Size of the clearance radius will depend on type of installation and the size of the tank.

Vertical Tanks – The requirements for the clearance around vertical propane tanks under 125 gallons depends on the location of ignition sources, venting windows and doors. The tank itself may be placed against the house or building, but it has to be at least ten (10) feet from an ignition source such as a water heater and three (3) feet from a venting window or door.



Horizontal Tanks – Horizontal tanks, also referred to as vessels, come in three main sizes: 330, 550 and 1,000 gallons. The size of the vessel normally depends on the propane requirements and the size of the structure using the fuel. The requirements for the clearance around the 330 and the 550 gallon propane tanks are at least ten (10) feet from the structure. Ten (10) feet from the property line and ten (10) feet from any ignition source. The 1,000 gallon propane tank requires at least twenty five (25) feet of clearance from the structure, the property line and any ignition sources.



Also, be aware that according to our Protective Covenants and ECC Manual, every fuel storage tank on any lot shall be either buried below ground or screened to the satisfaction of the Committee.

Please remember that if you apply for a permit, it is not automatically given. There is a process, which could take up to two (2) weeks.

The ECC has to review the application and then a permit is approved or denied. If you have been denied, the Hideout will send you a letter with the reason(s) why it was not approved. You can then make the corrections and it will be reviewed again at the next meeting. Also, remember that nearly everything you do outside of your home requires a permit. Please pick up your permits at the POA Office. When your project is complete, sign and return your permit to the POA.

MEMBERS AND CONTRACTORS

Among the items that the Environmental Control Committee will look for when going over your application is an "As Built" survey. There are several reasons for this:

- To be sure of the placement of any structures on your property
 - To be sure of setback lines
- When turning in an application for any of the below permits, you must have an "as built" survey.
- Garages (both detached and attached)
 - Decks • Driveways • Sheds
 - Additions

HIDEOUT PET REGULATIONS

as defined in the Consolidated Rules and Regulations. **Paragraph #8**, Page 7 states pets will not be allowed to enter any facility controlled or owned by the Association. (Exception Guide Dogs).

Paragraph #9, Page 8 states pets must be licensed, inoculated, leashed and kept under the owners control at all times.

Paragraph #20, Page 8 states it is the responsibility of the owner of the pet to clean up and remove animal excrement of their pet.

All Pet complaints are processed via the Hideout North Gate Control Center. The owner may be subjected to fines and or sanctions depending on the violation. In addition, the Wayne County Dog Warden has jurisdiction and will respond to animal complaints and take the appropriate action as deemed necessary. Pet regulations are in place for the protection of residents and guests and the ultimate goal is to seek voluntary compliance on the part of the membership.

HIDEOUT DOG PARK REGISTRATION

Bring proof of Rabies and Distemper Shots from your Veterinarian to the Registration Department at the POA. Vet forms must indicate that males are neutered. You will be asked to complete a Hideout Pet Registration Form. The Dog Park Registration section of the form is optional for members wishing to join the Dog Park. Registration will file copies of your documents, collect the \$5 annual fee and issue a Dog Collar Tag authorizing membership and admission to the Dog Park. Your pets must be registered even if you are not applying for Dog Park membership-however, there is no fee unless you are joining the Dog Park. The Dog Park Tag must be affixed to your dog's collar prior to entry to the Park. Note that a current amenity badge must also be carried in the Park at all times.

Dog Park Regulations - You must pick up after your dog. Owners ignoring this rule will be asked to leave and be denied future entry. Mutt mitts for waste disposal pick-up are available. Used Mitts must be placed in Trash containers. Aggressive dogs are not allowed and must be removed immediately. Each car must display a current Hideout Membership/visitor sticker on their vehicle. Each dog must display a Collar Tag issued by the Dog Park Committee indicating Veterinary Certification that each male dog is neutered and has a current immunization for: Rabies and Distemper. Female dogs in heat are not allowed in Park. Children under age of 12 may attend only under supervision of an adult and adult must be supervising the dog. Members may supervise no more than two dogs per adult. Hours of operation are posted. The Park is self policing and dog owners using Park enforce these rules. Small dogs are free to use the Small Dog Area & all areas of the Park. Large dogs must be kept out of the Small Dog Area.

Department of Health Launches “Stopping the Flu Starts with YOU” Campaign; Urges Pennsylvanians to Get Influenza Vaccine

Annual vaccines are key to flu protection

Harrisburg, PA – The Department of Health today launched the “Stopping the Flu Starts with YOU” campaign, which urges Pennsylvanians to protect themselves and their loved ones against the seasonal flu by getting vaccinated and taking other preventive measures. “Getting a vaccine is the first and best way to protect against the flu,” said Secretary of Health Dr. Karen Murphy. “We know that certain people are at greater risk for developing flu-related complications. These individuals include infants and children, seniors, pregnant women, and those with chronic medical conditions. It is especially important that these at-risk individuals get annual flu vaccines, as well as their caregivers and medical providers.”

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends a yearly flu vaccine for everyone 6 months of age and older. There are two important reasons to get a flu vaccine every year. First, flu viruses are constantly changing, and vaccines may be updated yearly to protect against the viruses that research indicates will be most common during the upcoming flu season. Second, a person’s immune protection from the vaccine decreases over time.

In addition to getting vaccinated, the Department of Health asks all Pennsylvanians to consider practicing the following preventive measures:

Wash hands often with soap and warm water or use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer. Cover nose and mouth with a tissue when coughing or sneezing, and throw any used tissues in the trash.

Keep hands away from face, and don’t touch eyes, nose, or mouth. Disinfect frequently used surfaces like doorknobs, light switches, TV remotes, or countertops.

Avoid contact with individuals who may have the flu. When sick, stay home until at least 24 hours after your fever goes away on its own without the use of fever-reducing medicine.

“Research supports the reality that getting a vaccine will not give an individual the flu,” said Secretary Murphy. “In fact, vaccines given with a needle do not contain ‘live’ flu viruses and cannot make you sick. If you do get sick after getting vaccinated, you were likely infected with the virus before vaccination or during the two-week window when your body is building up antibodies to protect you from the virus. Vaccines remain the safest, best protection against preventable illnesses like the flu.”

Flu seasons are unpredictable and can be severe. In the U.S., it is estimated that an average of 5 to 20 percent of the population gets the flu, and hundreds of thousands are hospitalized from seasonal flu-related complications. During Pennsylvania’s last flu season, there were 55,509 cases of flu, and 221 Pennsylvanians died from flu complications. Rates of serious illness and death are highest among persons over the age of 65 and individuals of any age who have chronic medical conditions that place them at increased risk for complications from influenza.

Can We Go Home Now? Shopping Strategies with Small Children

Holiday shopping can be chaotic, tiring, and frustrating. It becomes even more so when you have a small child with you, both for you and your child. These tips will help you cope with the job of holiday shopping with a little one.

Respect Limits - Children have only a short amount of time before they become bored, hungry, tired, or overstimulated. Limit your excursion to one or two hours. Be sure to bring some snacks and remove your child’s coat once you are indoors to prevent overheating. If you expect to have to wait in line, bring a book or small toy to keep him or her occupied.

Remember That Children Are Curious - Children are naturally curious. Explain to your child before you enter the store that they are only to touch items with your assistance. Engage your child in conversation and questions as you shop to make it more fun for both of you. This natural curiosity can lead a child to wander, so keeping within eyesight all the time is your best strategy.

Avoid the Crowds - Avoid shopping just before dinner, when the stores are crowded or the days right before Christmas. If possible, visit stores in the morning or early afternoons on weekdays or later in the evening between 6:00 and 7:00 pm.

Bring Some Help - Shop with another adult to help share the child care load. You can take turns browsing and spending time with the children. You will also probably enjoy the experience with a friend or family member shopping with you.

Have an Escape Plan - If you’ve reached the limit of your patience, take a break. Plan on leaving the store if you or your child gets too impatient, cranky, hungry, or tired. Trying to complete your purchases with this stress is counterproductive and will probably result in your disappointment in the outcome. If your child begins to have a meltdown, go outside for a few minutes, visit the food court, or just leave the store with a plan to return at another time. Remember that shopping can wait. An exhausted, hungry, or overexcited child cannot.

Holiday Cookies

Sugar Spiced Cookies

1 cup packed brown sugar
2 cups molasses
1/2 cup butter
1/2 cup vegetable oil
2 tsp. ground ginger

4 cups flour
1-1/2 tbsp baking soda
1 tbsp ground cinnamon
2 tsp ground cloves



Beat the sugar, molasses, butter, and oil together. Add 2 cups of the flour and the baking soda, cloves, ginger, and cinnamon. Mix in the remaining flour 1/2 cup at a time until the dough is stiff. Flatten into disks and cover with plastic wrap. Refrigerate for at least 1 hour. On a lightly floured surface roll the dough out 1/4 inch thick and use cookie cutters to cut into desired shapes. Place cookies on a baking sheet and bake at 350 degrees for 8 minutes. Makes 4 to 5 dozen cookies.

Peppermint Swirls

1 cup margarine or butter, softened
3 cups flour
1/2 tsp baking soda
1 cup sugar
1/4 tsp salt

1 egg
1/2 tsp peppermint extract
2 tsp milk
4 or 5 drops red food color
1 tsp vanilla



In a large bowl, combine margarine, sugar, egg, milk, and vanilla. Mix until light and fluffy. In a separate bowl, combine flour, baking soda, and salt. Add flour mixture to margarine mixture and mix well. Place half of the dough into a plastic bag. To remaining half of dough, add peppermint extract and red food color. Mix well. Place in plastic bag. Refrigerate both portions about 1 hour. Divide each portion of dough in half. Roll one part white dough into a 10 x 8 inch rectangle between two pieces of waxed paper. Set aside. Repeat with one part of the pink dough. Remove the top sheet of waxed paper from both the pink and the white dough. Place pink dough over white dough; remove plastic wrap from pink dough. Trim edges, if desired. Starting at the 10 inch edge, roll up dough jelly-roll fashion, removing plastic wrap from bottom as dough is rolled. Repeat with remaining dough to form second roll. Wrap in plastic wrap and refrigerate 8 hours or up to 1 week. To bake: Heat oven to 375 degrees. Slice cookies 1/8 inch thick. Place 1 inch apart on ungreased cookie sheets. Bake for 5 to 7 minutes or until light golden brown. Makes 10 dozen cookies.

Hanukkah

The joyous festival of Hanukkah begins on 25 Kislev of the Jewish calendar. It celebrates two miracles – a great Jewish military victory and a miraculous supply of oil for the Temple.

We celebrate Hanukkah – also called the Festival of Lights – for eight days. The Hanukkah menorah holds nine candles, one for each of the eight nights and an additional candle that's used to light the others. One candle is lit on the first night, two on the second night, until all eight candles are lit on the eighth night. Hanukkah is a time to celebrate with family and friends, to eat holiday treats, to give gifts (especially to children) and to play the dreidel game.

Hanukkah will be celebrated on the following dates: December 6 – 14, 2015 (Jewish year 5776)



Kwanzaa

Kwanzaa is an annual celebration that is meaningful to the African American community in the United States and around the world, but often not well known to those who do not observe the holiday every year. Kwanzaa lasts for a week every year, beginning on December 26 and ending on January 1.



Christmas

Christmas is celebrated on December 25. In the United States, families distribute gifts that Santa Claus left under the Christmas tree on Christmas morning. Many attend church services on Christmas Eve and Christmas morning, and later gather for Christmas dinner with extended family. Christmas is the observance of Jesus' humble birth to a virgin in a stable in Bethlehem. The holiday also celebrates the events surrounding his birth, such as an angel's appearance to shepherds, telling them to visit the newborn king.

Most of the traditional customs of Christmas, such as gift giving, tree decorating, light hanging, and feasting, come from sources other than the Church. Santa Claus seems to have originated from a Dutch legend about Sinter Klaas, which settlers brought to America in the seventeenth century. To many Americans, Santa Claus embodies the spirit of giving. To celebrate the nature of Santa Claus during the Christmas holidays, many people not only give gifts to loved ones, but they also donate time and money to charities.

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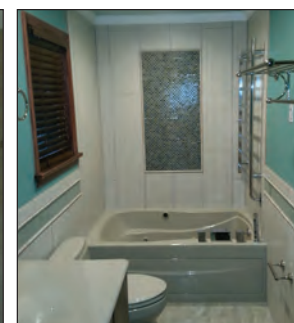
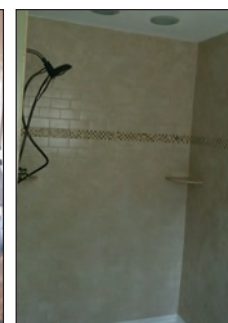
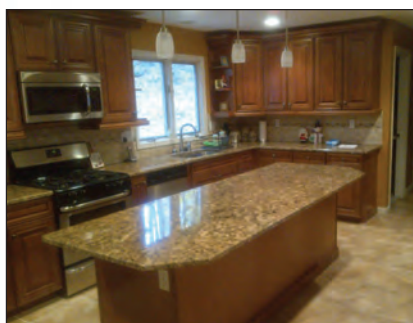

RSC Pass And Contract Time

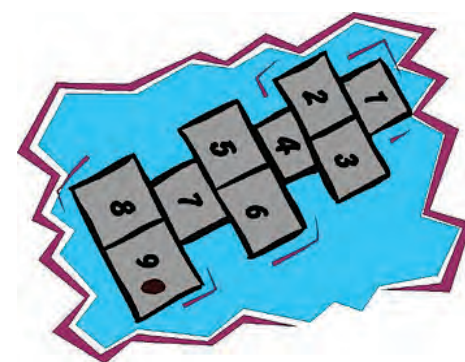

Money Tip

The best time to review your property insurance is before an event, not after. Examine your policy to make sure that you are not under-insuring and that you have enough coverage to take care of any losses. It is also good to read the fine print on your policy to understand any exclusions. It is hard to recover from a damaging event when you find out that you do not have adequate coverage after all.

Home Tip

Nothing dates a home more than an old popcorn textured ceiling. Luckily, you can easily remove this texture yourself. First, make sure there is no asbestos in the texture by having it tested by professionals. If it is all clear, you can visit your local home improvement store for a special solution that will soften the texture. Then simply scrape it away. You can retexture your ceiling or simply leave it smooth and paint it.

Car Tip

Grime from road salt and sand during the icy winter months can cause your car to look a mess. It might be tempting to forgo washing your vehicle, since you figure it will be dirty soon anyway. But the sand, ice, and road salt can cause corrosion, especially when the temperature is repeatedly rising and falling below freezing. If your car has this grime on it, it is better to remove it as frequently as possible.

Travel Tip

When you return home from a trip, be

sure to check your bank and credit card statements within a day or two of getting home. Watch for double charges, unauthorized spending, or missing refunds. If you've traveled overseas, it may be hard to resolve these issues directly with the merchant, but be sure to let your bank or credit card company know of the problems as soon as possible.

Green Living Tip

Did you know that "sell-by" and "use-by" dates on food products are not federally regulated? They are not intended to indicate how safe the food is to eat. Rather, they are just the manufacturer's recommendation for best quality. Almost all foods can be safely eaten after their use-by dates. Knowing this can help reduce your home food waste.

Food Tip

Uncut onions should not be stored in the refrigerator. Keep them in a cool, dark place with adequate ventilation. Once cut, onions should be refrigerated. If you are only using half of an onion, cut and use the top half. Keep the root half intact and save it for a later time. The root end of an onion will stay fresh longer.

Organizing Tip

Organize your favorite necklaces and bracelets by placing a wall-mounted peg coat rack within easy reach. Hang the jewelry to keep it tangle-free. This will also add some decorating interest to your room as you can display your most attractive jewelry.

Trunk or Treat

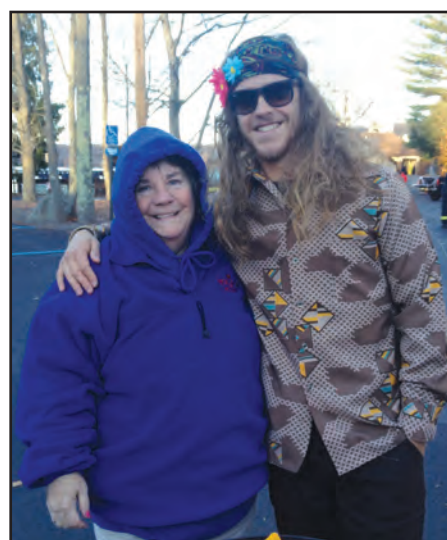

GOLD WEATHER RECORDS

Butte, Montana, has more days each year where the temperature drops below freezing (223 days) than any other city in the lower 48 states of the U.S.

The snowiest U.S. location, based on average snowfall, is Stampede Pass, Washington, with 440.3 inches.

Based on normal daily minimum temperature, Barrow, Alaska, is the coldest U.S. city with a normal daily temperature of 4.1 degrees Fahrenheit.

Rogers Pass, Montana, holds the distinction of being the coldest U.S. location in the lower 48 states with a record low of -70 degrees F (-57 degrees C) on January 20, 1954.

The coldest temperature ever recorded anywhere on Earth was at Vostok Station in Antarctica on July 21, 1983. It dipped down to -128.6 degrees F (-89.2 degrees C) that day.

The most snow recorded in a one-year period in the United States was 102 feet (31.5 meters) during the winter of 1971-1972 on Mount Rainier, Washington.

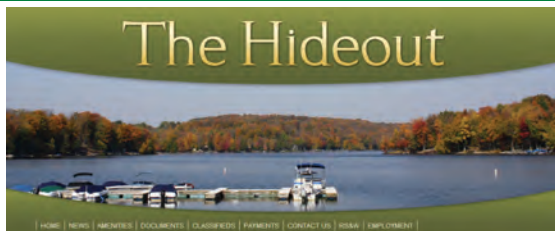

WANTED: CITIZEN SCIENTISTS WITH CAMERAS

The Pennsylvania Mammal Atlas needs your help.

It's just before dark and you see an elusive mammal. If you are lucky, you snap a good picture before it takes off. You wonder if others have seen it too. Is it common to find this animal in your county? Now you can find out.

The Pennsylvania Game Commission and its partners at the Pennsylvania Biological Survey have created a website for just that. When visiting www.pamammalatlasc.com you can browse maps, statistics, photographs, and descriptions of each wild mammal species in Pennsylvania. You also can search through photographs submitted by other outdoor enthusiasts.

Consider registering as a volunteer and sharing your own photographs while you are at it. In doing so, you will greatly help biologists working on the Pennsylvania Mammal Atlas.

What is the Pennsylvania Mammal Atlas?

The Pennsylvania Mammal Atlas is a project designed to map the current locations of the 64 wild mammal species found in Pennsylvania.

Atlas projects aren't a new idea, but this is the first such project for mammals in Pennsylvania.

"The result of this project will be an approximately 10-year snapshot of Pennsylvania wild mammal distributions" said Lindsey Heffernan, a wildlife biologist for the Pennsylvania Game Commission. "While professional biologists will be traveling around the state conducting in-depth surveys, we simply can't cover enough ground. Citizen scientists will be crucial in helping us to search the entire Commonwealth."

Why is the Pennsylvania Mammal Atlas Important?

In completing the Pennsylvania Mammal Atlas project, citizens and researchers will gather much-needed information on rare and elusive mammal species. Species distribution maps will be updated, and researchers will have a greater foundation for future projects and a better understanding of where to focus conservation efforts.

"This project is also important long-term, as the world we live in is constantly changing," Heffernan said. "Climate change, human activities, and population growth are among the list of things that could, and likely will, have some effect on wild animals.

"By creating a repeatable atlas, biologists will have the data they need to analyze those changes in mammal distributions past, present, and future," Heffernan said.

You'll need it in January If you haven't had a flu shot, don't delay, get one now!

It's not too late to protect yourself from the traditional bulge in flu cases that usually occurs in January.

This year's flu shot will be more effective than last year's. The CDC has taken steps to avoid a repeat of the 2014-2015 flu season by producing a broader version of the vaccine to better match circulating viruses. Even so, there's no guarantee that this year's vaccine will be effective against all strains. If you get the flu in spite of getting a shot, you'll have a much milder case, and it will prevent influenza-related complications such as pneumonia.

The problem with last year's was that the H3N2 strain suddenly appeared long after the vaccine was produced, rendering the vaccine ineffective in many people, particularly the elderly.

CDC experts have developed the 2015-2016 vaccine with the influenza type A viruses H3N2 and H1N1, which was the cause of the 2009 epidemic. An influenza B component is also included. These strains are currently circulating in the United States and the world.

In spite of last year's failure to protect many people from the flu, you shouldn't use it as an excuse not to get a flu shot.

Everyone 6 months old and older should be vaccinated against influenza each year.

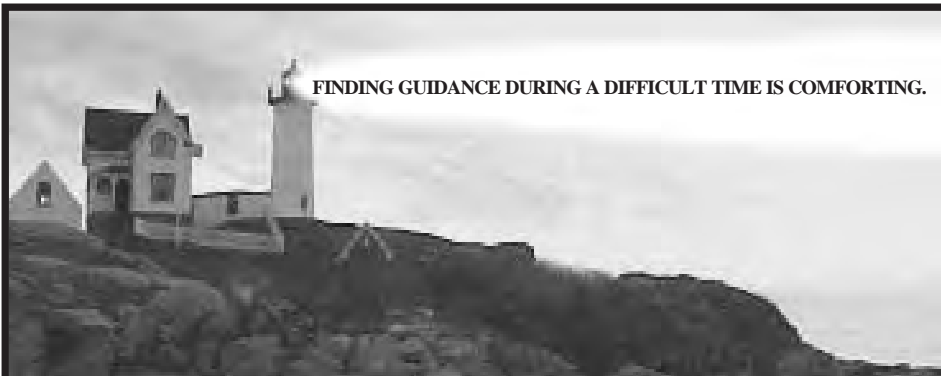

DEP Encourages Pennsylvanians to Winterize Their Homes

Winterization increases energy efficiency, reducing energy use and saving money

Colder winter weather is on the way and the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection wants all residents to stay safe and warm this winter by properly preparing their homes. Home winterization can help keep your home warmer, while using less energy and costing less money. According to the U.S. Energy Information Administration, the average Pennsylvania family consumes more than 10,000 kWh of electricity annually and spends more than \$2000 per year on energy bills. Half the energy consumed in Pennsylvania homes is for space heating. Fortunately, homeowners can take small steps to make their home safe and more efficient.

"With smart, inexpensive fixes, Pennsylvanians can keep their homes warmer and save money this winter," said DEP Secretary John Quigley. "The time to take steps to make your home ready for the cold weather is now, before it gets here."

Consider these tips this winter to keep your home running efficiently:

- Set back the thermostat; each degree lowered can save up to 3 percent on heating. A programmable thermostat, which cost as little as \$20 at a local hardware store, can be programmed to be setback automatically at designated timeframes, saving you more energy and money.
- Clean warm-air registers, baseboard heaters, and radiators regularly and make sure they are not blocked by furniture, carpeting, or drapes.
- Weather-strip windows and exterior doors where you can feel air leakage. Check the bottom of the door to see if there is a gap. If there is a gap of a quarter inch or more, significant air can flow in and out of the house. Install a door sweep on the bottom of the door. Weather-stripping for the windows and doors is available in foam, rubber, vinyl and metal. For homes without storm windows, consider purchasing a window insulator kit (plastic window coverings). Install insulating drapes or curtains for windows that still feel drafty after weatherizing.
- Use the sunlight to heat your home by opening the curtains on south-facing windows during sunny days and close all curtains at night.
- Check the door to the attic to make sure it seals well and closes tightly. Some manufacturers make insulated attic covers.
- Do not heat unused spaces, other than as needed to prevent freezing of pipes. Close vents in unused rooms.
- If you have a wood stove, be sure to clean the flue vent and inside of the stove regularly.
- If you have a fireplace, reduce heat loss from the fireplace by keeping the damper closed; when open, warm air goes up the chimney. Install tempered

glass and a heat-air exchange system that blows warmed air back into the room. Check the seal on the fireplace damper and ensure it is snug and add caulking around the hearth. It is a good idea to have a carbon monoxide monitor, as well.

If you have a furnace, have it checked by a heating professional. This will make the unit more efficient, and provide peace of mind that it is running safely. A heating professional should check the exhaust flue and venting to prevent carbon monoxide poisoning. Be sure to replace the air filter as directed to keep the air in your home clean and the unit running well. A properly maintained furnace can result in a 10 percent reduction in fuel consumed.

The most cost-effective way to save energy in the home is to air seal and insulate.

- Be sure to air seal before insulating as insulation material will not block leaks.
- Find and seal air leaks with caulk around windows, doors, gaps around chimneys, and recessed lights in insulated ceilings.
- Fill larger cracks with spray foam. Always follow the directions on the caulking and spray foam containers to ensure proper adherence and safety.
- After all the cracks are filled, you can install the insulation. Use the U.S. Department of Energy's insulation page to determine what kind of insulation you should use and how to put it in your home.

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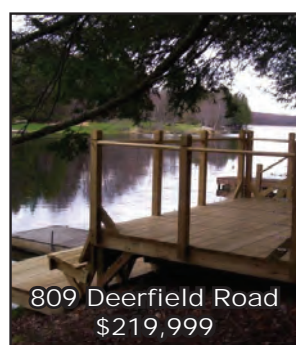

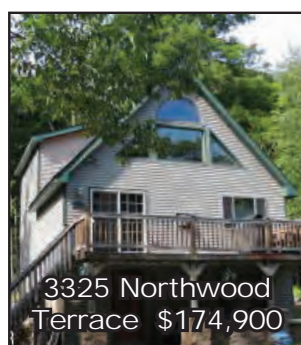

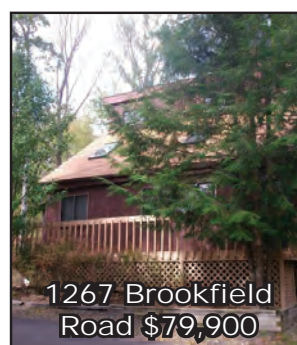

Here are some things to help with your shots from a fairway bunker.

1. Use the same ball placement and stance as in a normal fairway shot.
2. Dig your feet into the sand for a stable base.
3. Take extra club and shorten your grip on the club to compensate for your lowered stance position.
4. Keep the lower body still to avoid slipping.
5. Try to contact the ball first and then the sand. Try looking at the front of the ball and see if that helps to make ball first contact.

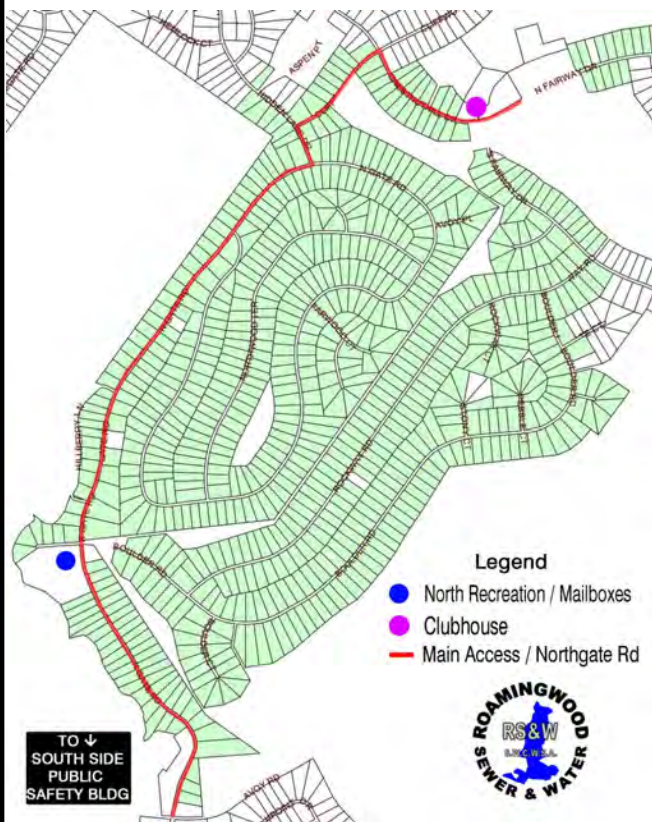

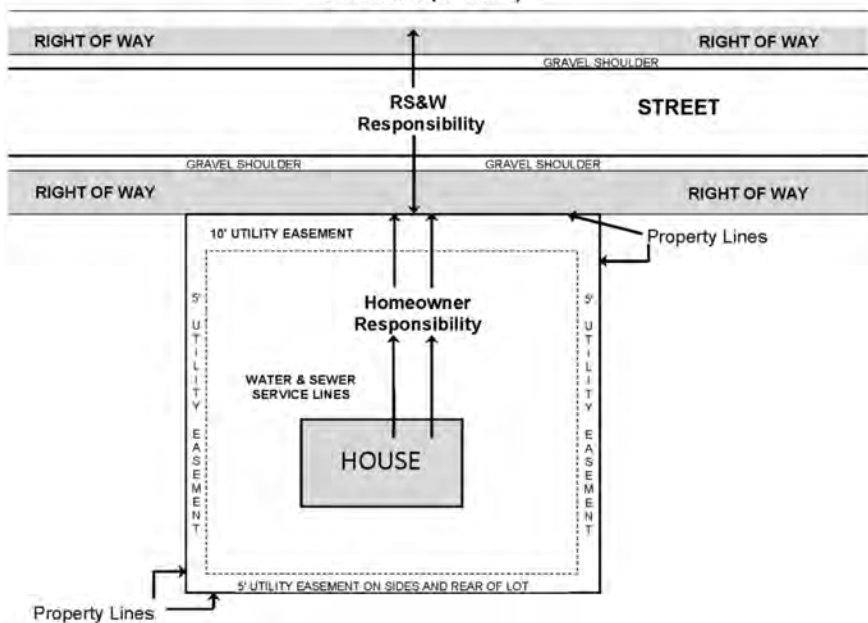

The Board of Directors of the Association of Property Owners of the Hideout, Inc. is pleased to present the 2016 proposed budget. As required by the Property Owners Association (POA) bylaws, the budget is now being placed before the members for 30 days of review.

The Board welcomes member comments and questions about the budget. Please forward your comments, concerns or ideas in writing to the community manager's office in the POA administration building or via e-mail to iacla@thehideout.us

Additionally, a meeting on the proposed budget has been scheduled on 9:00 A.M. Saturday, December 12, 2015 at the POA Administration building. All interested members are urged to attend.

The Board of Directors wants to express their appreciation to the Hideout Management Team and the members of the Budget Committee for their hard work in putting together this budget. The work is both time consuming and difficult and requires making carefully considered assumptions based on projections and best estimates. The committee's recommendations were most useful to the board in preparing this proposed budget.

The goal of the Board of Directors was to prepare this budget to maintain the current services to the community while keeping the dues at the lowest possible level.

The operating budget is flat except for wage, insurance, water and sewer increase. We are still awaiting the 2016 insurance, water, and sewer costs. These additional costs make it necessary to increase the assessment by \$10 per lot.

The Capital, New Capital, and General Reserves have been maintained at the present level. All of the managers looked at their "wants list" and reevaluated it to a "must have list" to maintain service in 2016.

There is a \$5 per lot increase in sanitation which is necessary to cover the costs.

The Water Management Reserves projects are being completed according to the plans, but at a slower pace which will not negatively impact the projects. This being said it will still require an additional \$10 per lot to cover the costs.

At this time we are still awaiting studies on gypsy moth and wildlife management. The proposed budget was done assuming that both of these items would have to be done to some degree. It is therefore necessary to increase this reserve by \$15 per lot for the funding of the projects.

The total assessment increase is \$40 over 2015 or 2.5%.

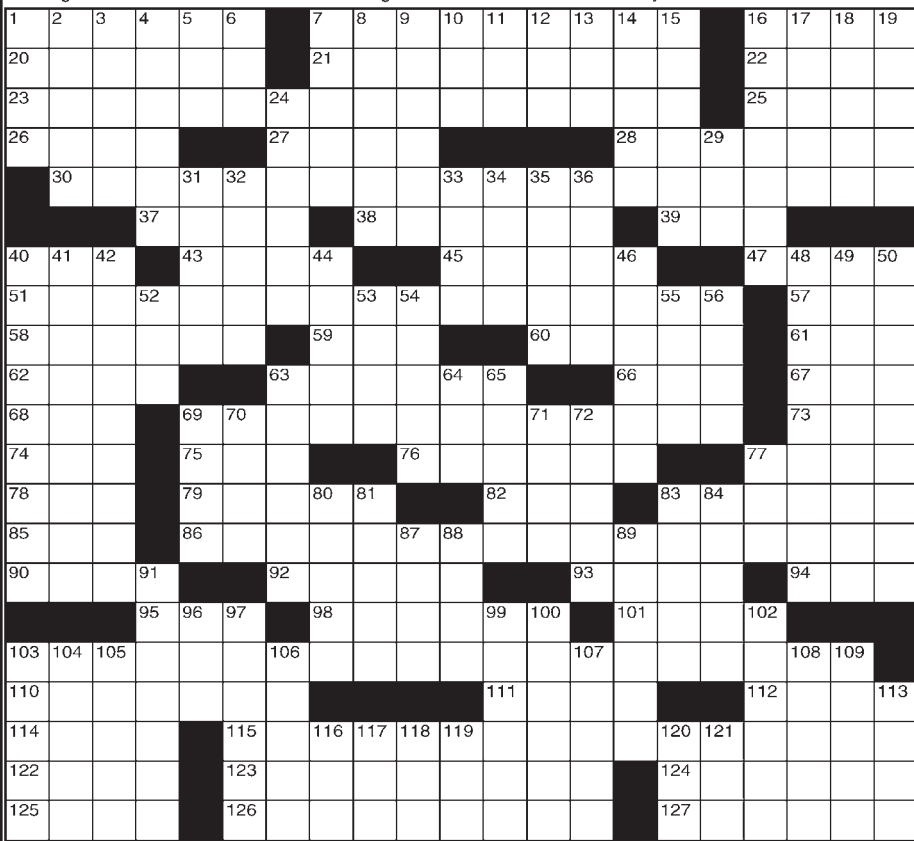

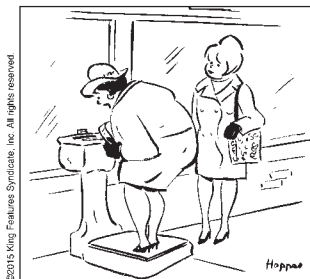

They were early 20th century cafeterias where people could survey dishes placed in windowed compartments and pop in a nickle to serve themselves a helping of pie or macaroni and cheese.
