# President's Message

Happy summer everyone!

Yes, summer is here and it is time for family & friends to get together and have cookouts, enjoy the pools and beaches, perhaps some fishing, tennis, pickleball or mini golf. Enjoy the amenities and let's remember to respect our neighbors, all fellow members, and staff.



If you have not heard the POA is planning to open up a realty office to sell homes and vacant lots within the community. The plan is to be open by January of 2018. The goal is to create

revenue for the association while keeping annual dues to a minimum. With the constant increases of insurance, wages, benefits and everything else as well as the need to maintain and upgrade existing facilities there will be the need for increased revenues so our hopes are this new venture will assist with that.

Some of the projects that the Board is looking to accomplish are an upgrade to the Main Lodge and Tiki Bar areas. However, prior to making any renovations at the Main Lodge we must meet ADA requirements such as an elevator and installation of a fire suppression system within the building. The estimated amount for this is approximately 2.5 million to be spent over the next five years. This project has been discussed over the past three to five years and I feel the Board is determined to get the project moving forward within the next couple years. A few other capital projects being looked at are upgrades to the Main Gate entrance area and the completion of a 4 ft. wide walking path along Lakeview Drive which will coincide with RS&W's Stage 3 paving project.

Another issue soon to be on the table that was discussed at last month's Board Meeting is implementing a rule to set limits on the amount of domestic pets each household may have. Some members have been requesting an ordinance like this for years. I feel that this will benefit all members of the Association so please keep an eye out for this upcoming Rule and Regulation.

On a household note, now is the time to run the dehumidifier in the basement area of your home. When the weather is hot, the contrast of temperature between the inside and outside will cause humidity to form on the cool side which now is the inside of your basement. Make sure it can run for a minimum of 8 hours a day so it is able to be drained or pumped out.

I hope to serve the community, managers, and staff well for the next four months as your Board President.

All Hideout homes within the project area, whether they currently have a sewage pump system or not, will require a pump to connect to the new low-pressure sewage system.

#### CONSTRUCTION AREAS AND WORK SCHEDULING

#### **Stage 3 Construction Has Begun**

The third and final stage of construction has just begun under a general and electrical contract on May 30, 2017.


Stage 3 home inspections are 96% complete and we encourage all homeowners to call our construction office and set up an appointment if you have not done so already. The inspection is the first of two appointments where the homeowner must provide access to the interior of the house. The inspection

takes about a  $\frac{1}{2}$  hour where we inspect the electrical panel and sewer system in the home to assess the compatibility with the new system.

RS&W has begun scheduling a second appointment in the Stage 3 area to install the control panel for the street side pump or the new retrofit pump inside your home.



There are tremendous recreational opportunities to enjoy here at the Hideout! Fishing, boating, swimming are now in full swing on our beautiful and vast lakes. I would like to remind our members to boat safely and adhere to our safety rules.

Attention Canoe/Non-Powered Boat Owners: Since 2011, non-powered boat use on our lakes has increased over 40%. In our attempt to promote safe boating on Roamingwood Lake, we have worked with the PA Boat Commission and received approval to install additional No-Wake Buoys. These Buoys have



#### **Environmental Control Committee (ECC) Matters:**

#### A. Attention Members!

- A reminder to members that the lot number MUST be posted on your address post. A Board motioned past last year now requires that your lot number be posted, so as similar to your 911 numbers, public safety officials can respond efficiently to your property in an emergency situation. We will begin enforcing this motion in July.
- Building Permit: Once you obtain a building permit, it must be posted on-site; preferably on your address post.
- Please clean up waste from your pets. Do not leave it to decay on the grass near the street. Pet waste that decays and washes into our lakes uses up oxygen and can release ammonia. Low oxygen levels in the lakes and ammonia combined with warm lake water temperatures can kill fish. Also, pets, by means of consuming pet food introduce additional nutrients (phosphorus and nitrogen) to the watershed/ lakes that could further enhance algae and weed growth. Moreover, pet waste not only affects water quality but also can affect your health. Various diseases and parasites can be transmitted from pet waste to humans.

I would like to extend my sincerest thanks to all the golfers and sponsors for their generous contribution to the Hideout Pennsylvania State Police Camp Cadet Golf Tournament which was held back on June 10. This year marked our 24th Anniversary of the Hideout's Camp Cadet Golf Tournament and we were honored to sponsor it. Because of their support and

### FROM ROBERT BRINSFIELD, FACILITIES MANAGER **Public Works Corner**

It's summertime and while the warm weather offers more outdoor activities, an opportunity for an influx of mosquitoes also rises. Although encounters are inevitable, there are ways each person can help control the nuisance.

Mosquito larvae thrive in shallow standing water. Buckets, flowerpot saucers, kiddie pools, birdbaths, and pet dishes are examples of potential nesting grounds. Try to routinely patrol around your property and empty anything that has stagnant water. Eliminating the opportunity to breed is the first line of defense against these pesky bugs.



When outdoors, wear a repellent to avoid bites. Candles and bug zappers are also effective ways to ward off adult mosquitoes. Keep flying insects out of the home by making sure windows and door screens are in good shape with a 16-18 mesh. High grass and unpruned vegetation offer a safe haven for bugs. Mowing lawns and proper landscaping will help to reduce mosquitoes around your home.

#### **Bug Safety Tips:**

- Wear a long-sleeved shirt, long pants, and socks.
- Avoid wearing bright colors and perfumes.
- Apply lotion, liquid, or spray repellent to exposed skin.
- Repellents can wear off and may need a reapplication.
- For ticks, when in grass or vegetation, check your entire body and remove attached ticks promptly.
  Seek medical attention if necessary for bug bites.

#### **Registration and Login Process**

- 1. Member Registration To register your account, click on the 'Member Registration' link and complete the fields within the registration form.
- 2. Validation Enter your Member Number, First name and Last name exactly as they appear on your last paper statement (Note: your First name is typically in our system as your given name). The system will then validate whether the information entered is correct. If the information entered does not exactly match that which is present in your club's files, you will be unable to register. If you continue experiencing issues, please contact the club for assistance.
- 3. Setup Username and Password You will then be taken to a page to set your username, password and email address (for website communication). The system will suggest a username (but this can be changed). It will ask you to enter and confirm a password of choice. In the event the password is forgotten, please enter in an email address to which a 'Reset Password' link can be sent. Once all fields are filled out, click on 'Create User' to complete the registration process.
- 4. Email Confirmation Upon successful registration, an email message will be sent to the email address entered during the registration process.

# Meet our POA Board Candidates

# Jerry Restaino

Hello friends, neighbors and Hideout residents. My name is Gerard Restaino, but I am known as Jerry Restaino, and I am one of the candidates for the POA Board of Directors. I have a simple philosophy, you pass this way once and must give back. My background and life experiences as set forth below certainly exemplify that philosophy. My major position for being a candidate for a Board of Directors position is to preserve the Hideout as a Gold Star recreational community.

I was born and raised in Newark, NJ, and graduated from Newark State Teachers' College in Union, NJ. I have a BA degree in Industrial Arts and began my teaching career in Newark, NJ (1963-65) assigned to two elementary schools teaching deaf and physically handicapped students. It was challenging and emotional. I then taught Industrial Arts at a junior high school in Edison, NJ (1965-70) where I met my wife Judy, who taught German and later on ESL. We were married in 1967 and bought our first home in Metuchen, NJ. During the next several years our two sons, Gary and John, were born.



We purchased our first home in the Hideout in 1993, our current home in 2001 and became full time residents in 2003. As part-time residents we enjoyed all of the amenities whenever we spent time here. I appreciated reading the Hideabout which gave me a perspective on the community and our investment for the future. Since we have been full-time residents I attend Board meetings and have been concerned and interested in all issues which affect the community. I also belong to the Woodworkers Club and the Hideout Adult Social Group. I am a member of the new Governing Documents Committee, and we are committed to submitting recommendations to the Board for Bylaw changes for a vote by the community. My wife is a member of the Lakes Committee and volunteers at the library in Hamlin.

The Hideout is a terrific, well-established recreation community with a diverse population that can and should take advantage of our amenities. I was recently informed that a new full-time couple purchased here only after looking at many other communities and felt the Hideout is the best. The indoor tennis courts sold them on buying a home in the Hideout. As an arbitrator/mediator the following has served me well: if you always do what you always do, you will always get what you always get. We need to involve more residents in the decision-making process, be it volunteering on a committee or becoming a Board candidate. I find it amazing that a minority of residents make decisions that impact the majority. When was the last time that a majority of our residents voted in an annual election? Moreover, I am extremely concerned about our shrinking property values, and I plan to work toward reversing that uncomfortable trend.

In my second year of teaching in Edison I became a representative for the Edison Township Education Association (ETEA) and addressed and resolved problems for my colleagues. I became more active with the ETEA and was appointed the Grievance Chairperson for the entire Association. This was at the time when NJ public employees were granted statutory rights to negotiate collectively, which resulted in written contracts/agreements.

In June of 1970 I made a life-changing decision to take advantage of a contractual provision and took a leave of absence from teaching and became the first full-time president of an education association in the entire state of NJ. As the full-time President I was responsible for developing the ETEA's budget, meeting with local, county, state and national elected officials, negotiating successor contracts and handling grievances and arbitration cases. The one thing I learned that has served me well to the present is that negotiations is the art of compromise while not losing sight of your goal; being flexible, patient and creative usually will help you achieve your goal. In September of 1975 I joined the staff of the New Jersey Education Association (NJEA) and was assigned to a Regional Office with a partner and 4500 members. I did the same thing as I did in Edison, except on a much larger scale.

In 1993 I retired from NJEA and took over my dad's electrical contracting business while starting a part-time arbitration practice. At that time I also had a NJ State Electrical Contractor's License and Business Permit. I bid the jobs, worked on the jobs, met with inspectors, designers, builders, got more work, and paid all bills. In 1998 I completed the last electrical installation, closed the business, and became a self-employed full-time arbitrator.

Because I was a known quantity based on my days in Edison and the NJEA staff, I was quickly accepted on various arbitration panels in NJ, NY, PA, as well as the Federal Government. In 2000 I became a member of the National Academy of Arbitrators (NAA). I became actively involved in the NAA with various committees and rose to be the Regional Chair of Region 3, Philadelphia for a 2 year period. I am still an active arbitrator handling a myriad of cases.

To be a successful and acceptable arbitrator I need to be flexible, sensitive, inventive, patient, assertive, have good communications skills, and maintain a high level of integrity. All of the above clearly and without reservation demonstrate that I can be a very successful Board member.



# Avoiding Hand & Wrist Injuries

Whether you're an athlete playing your favorite sport or a "weekend warrior" who enjoys hitting North Fairway Drive for a game of golf,



or grabbing your racket and heading for the RSC Courts, your hands and wrists are uniquely prone to athletic and overuse injuries. As a physical therapist, I see an increase of injuries to the hands and wrists facing athletes this time of the year. With so many bones, ligaments, tendons, and joints keeping hands and wrists working, there is ample opportunity for injury.

Two Categories of Hand & Wrist Injuries: Traumatic (acute) injuries- include sprains, muscle strains, tendon inflammation, ligament tears, joint dislocations, and broken bones. These are more likely to occur in athletes who participate in sports that require higher levels of contact (hockey, football, or wrestling).

**Overuse** (chronic) injuries- are stress-induced and include tendon inflammation and dislocation, nerve injury, and overuse stress fractures. These often result in athletes who participate in sports that require them to "repeat" a particular movement (tennis, golf or baseball).

#### **Preventative Measures:**

- Do sport-specific stretching & strengthening exercises.
- Always stretch before playing.
- Take breaks.
- Don't play through pain.
- Wear protective equipment- wrist guards & gloves.
- Use proper technique & posture.

Some of these injuries may not seem serious at first, but if left untreated, could put you on the sidelines for months. They may also have a lasting effect on your comfort and everyday function. Physical therapy is a treatment option for many of the injuries mentioned above. A physical therapist can also help devise the proper stretching & strengthening plan for your particular activities in helping you to prevent some of the overuse injuries in your particular sport!



## Lakes Committee Draft Minutes of Meeting - 4/22/17

Chair: Tim Jeffers.

Staff: John Gigliotti, Manager and Francine Spinelli, Administrative Assistant. Board of Directors Liaison: Barry Neiss Excused: Charlie Durkin, Rick Nolte, Karen Greenfield, Jim McLoone, and Arnie Milidantri, Guest: Eileen Culley, 851 Deerfield Road

The meeting was called to order at

T. Jeffers advised one order of business if Francine taking notes and recording, asked the Committee to announce their name and can associate with comments. Second order of business is the minutes of last month. No one had any comments. The minutes were approved with a motion by L. Garlasco, a second by B. Kravetz, and approval by all (8-0-0).

T. Jeffers advised last meeting went through program and good communication with Dr. Lubnow of Princeton Hydro. Opinions were voiced on some issues to his program, i.e. fishing.

T. Jeffers asked J. Gigliotti if he has key dates for budgeting. J. Gigliotti advised he does not have exact dates and is working on preliminary operations and capital and will be submitted to the Budget Committee starting in June. Further, J. Gigliotti advised he has a rough draft of what he would like to do with some adjustments to the dredge plan to Roamingwood Lake which will be a two year process and that requires complex permitting. J. Gigliotti will give T. Jeffers the exact dates in June.

#### **DEERFIELD LAKE:**

- 1. Aeration System: J. Gigliotti presented photos of the new aeration system. New system should be operational next week. Electrician coming on Monday to do wiring. Fish stocking order has been placed. B. Kravitz asked if the system will be marked for future. J. Gigliotti advised it is GPS located. No marine floats required.
- 2. Eileen Culley, 851 Deerfield Rd.: Will there be aeration in the corner where there is a lot of lily pods. The truxtor will take care of this and then will spot

spray. T. Jeffers advised the aeration system will give oxygen into the water to eliminate sediments and phosphates in the water. E. Culley - when the ski hill work disrupted water flow between boats and her house. Needs to be cleared out. J. Gigliotti advised it was channeled and that this area is a wetland. E. Culley advised there are ducks at the end of her driveway by the road and should not have that much water for the ducks. J. Gigliotti will look at this. E. Culley - Fire Dept. trucks were running water and it was spraying across the street for hours at full blast. B. Neiss advised the hydrant was on for training at this site.

3. Canary Grass: Did we treat canary grass at Deerfield? J. Gigliotti advised there was not a problem only at the pump house and by Eileen's house.

#### **ROAMINGWOOD LAKE:**

1. Gate Valve: New main valve is now fully installed and operational. They will be back in the fall to install the five foot valve when the lake is lowered. This will occur sometime after Columbus holiday. J. Silverman asked how does J. Gigliotti control the lake. He advised he would start with the side valve to lower the water. He can use any valve. J. Restaino asked if the cost was higher to install the main gate valve since it took longer. J. Gigliotti advised the additional cost was not absorbed by the Hideout due to it being a contractor issue. K. Fairchild asked about the small valve size. J. Gigliotti advised it is 4 feet wide and 4 feet high, goes up and down and draw down depends on the weather. Side valve is higher and placed at the bottom of the lake.

#### 2. Winter Recreation on the Lake:

L. Kravetz asked about ice fishing on the lake as it was allowed years ago. B. Neiss commented it is a danger issue and a liability. T. Jeffers advised he went to the Board three years ago and the attorney was present and talked about winter use of the lake. There is a liability and also there is training, response time by EMS, equipment needed for ice rescue and policies and procedures to put in place to identify when it is safe to enter the lake. There is a monetary and logistic expense and the Board did not want to move

forward. More discussion followed on ice skating, etc. and T. Jeffers advised this is all about winter use of the lakes and went back to approaching the Board with the lawyers. Too much logistics and costs.

3. Fish Stocking: J. Gigliotti advised putting in the lake 200 walleye, 150 small mouth and fat head minnows into the lake. Fathead minnows will also spawn.

B. Kravetz advised about the upcoming fish tournaments. Recreation coordinates this event.

4. 5 feet Draw Down: T. Jeffers asked that when we start the draw down in the fall to let people know so boats are not in the water. J. Gigliotti advised he will put an article advising all.

5. Dock in Marina: J. Restaino asked when the docks will be placed in the Marina, J. Gigliotti advised roughly May 1. **BROOKS LAKE:** 

 J. Gigliotti advised the biggest challenge this year is that the lake was never permitted and is combining this task with the dredging. Working with DEP and Harrisburg on the permitting. Dr. Givler will do an official inspection. Critical part is the spillway is large enough so no modifications there. One thing to do on the bottom of the concrete weir has a metal plug and they need to know if this is operational. Will have to get in there to see if it works, if not then will put in the budget. Discussion followed. K. Fairchild asked if it was to be fixed, can we get a conditional for dredging. K. Fairchild expressed disappointment the dredging is held up until fall and noted the tree stumps left where excavating was done looks like a war zone and if anything can be done. T. Jeffers advised this is a side effect of excavating. This area will be reconditioned when the dredging project is complete and possibly add additional boat racks, landscape. This fall the area will be prepped and then begin dredging and that excavation is integral with dredging and trees will be planted. T. Jeffers advised that members of Brooks notice this and department is trying to accomplish all this. B. Kravetz thought of putting boat racks in would encourage people to use the lake. J. Gigliotti advised when done dredging we will enlarge parking also.

T. Jeffers explained about Dam Safety and what they do and about classification rated to hazard rating. If the dam would break, what is the hazard, J. Gigliotti advised not as bad as Deerfield or Roamingwood. J. Gigliotti advised the aeration is huge and the fall dredging. Deerfield and Brooks are clear flow systems and taking the motor and compressors that are new and using as a backup for Brooks. T. Jeffers asked how many more years do we have, J. Gigliotti advised in the reserve study, possibly 10 years before the motors have to be changed out and marine tubing, 15 years before changing out. Brooks has the same tubing but porcelain aerators. T. Jeffers asked if the Truxor has been scheduled. J. Gigliotti advised the Truxtor comes in every year around Memorial holiday. Will look at Brooks and Deerfield for maintenance. Water quality monitoring will start next week. T. Jeffers asked about the baffle box plans and requested J. Gigliotti asked it be sent to him and the committee and to follow-up with canary grass issues.

#### **NEW BUSINESS:**

1. K. Fairchild - under Lake & Environment related-trees planted in the entry way. J. Gigliotti advised a lot of trees are growing and will mark trees that are not growing. Public Works is swamped and this will have to wait until after the summer. T. Jeffers asked if these are the ones Public Works put in and J. Gigliotti advised yes. New Trees are mostly surviving as a professional company came in and did the planting. T. Jeffers noted it is cost effective to have Public Works plant the trees. J. Gigliotti advised he will try to get in there to mark some of those and then make a plan.

**2. B. Kravetz** – 2nd fish tourney, put in minnows first before the tourney. Do we have to go to the Board? J. Gigliotti advised he would talk to Joe and will look at the fish stocking budget. B. Kravetz would like to see some in before June tourney.

The next meeting will be on May 20. The meeting was adjourned at 10:30AM with a motion by J. Restaino, a second by L. Garlasco and approval by all (8-0-0).



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
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

# **Boating at the Hideout**

Boat Registration in the Hideout began on **Sat., April 1**. All Hideout members must register their **power and non-power boats** at the Recreational Sports Complex before using them on the Hideout lakes.

**BOAT REGISTRATION** - Maximum boat size-17ft., Maximum *Four stroke* engine horsepower, 90hp. \*Used boats owned by a Hideout Property owner and were previously registered for Roamingwood Lake and are sold to another Hideout Property owner for use on Roamingwood Lake will be considered "grandfathered" and will be exempt from the Four Stroke Motor only restriction.

PERSONAL WATERCRAFT - i.e. Jet Skis and Wave Runners are subject to a maximum of 110 horsepower provided the PWC has a four (4) stroke engine. Maximum horsepower for a two (2) stroke engine is eighty-five (85) horsepower.

All powerboat and Personal Watercraft owners must have the appropriate documents on file with the Recreation Department in order to re-register. This includes current amenity badge, a copy of their insurance naming the Hideout as certificate holder\* and current state registrations for both boat, PWC and trailer.

All <u>new PWC owners</u> must bring their craft and boating safety certificate to the Recreation Department.

All owners of watercrafts (20hp or more) must have at least \$250,000 bodily injury liability coverage and \$50,000 property damage liability coverage.

Owners of watercraft nineteen (19hp or less - not including electrically powered) must have at least \$100,000 in liability insurance.

Electrically propelled watercraft(s) need a State Registration but do not require a Certificate of Insurance.

#### The Hideout must be named as certificate holder on the insurance policy.







#### **CERTIFICATION COURSE**

American Red Cross Lifeguard Course - The purpose of the American Red Cross Lifeguarding course is to provide entry-level lifeguard participants with the knowledge and skills to prevent, recognize and respond to aquatic emergencies and to provide care for breathing and cardiac emergencies, injuries and sudden illnesses until emergency medical services (EMS) personnel take over.

Minimum age 15 on or before the final scheduled class

Pass pre-course swim tests:

- 1. Swim 300 yards continuously demonstrating breath control and rhythmic breathing. Candidates may swim using the front crawl, breaststroke or a combination of both but swimming on the back or side is not allowed, goggles permitted.
- 2. Tread water for 2 minutes using only the legs.
- 3. Starting in the water, swim 20 yards, surface dive to a depth of 7-10 feet, retrieve a 10 pound object, return to surface and swim 20 yards with legs only and exit the water in 1 minute 40 seconds (goggles are not permitted).
- 100% class attendance and participation.

Pass both a water skills test and written exam.

Participants should bring a whistle/lanyard, pen/pencil and paper. Attendance at all classes is required.




# Pickleball Against Prostate Cancer Tournament



## **Artist Of The Month**

The Hideout would like to congratulate Michael Seiden for being chosen as The Hideout's July Artist-of-the Month. Dr. Seiden will be displaying his photographs' at the Nubia Malkin Art Center throughout the month of July so be sure to stop by to view his collection and sign his register book while you're here! His Artist's Statement is as follows: As a student at Columbia University, in the summer of 1973, I had the opportunity to "bum" across the United States, Canada and Mexico with my good buddy Steve in his little Fiat sports car. I knew little of the world outside Brooklyn where I grew up. To me at that time, nature was limited to the trees erupting through the concrete streets of Bensonhurst. The world was different then. Gas was 30 cents a gallon, no cellphones, no GPS and no digital cameras. Armed with a Yashica camera that an uncle gave me, Steve and I, inspired by the Simon and Garfunkel song America, took off on our own journey, to "Look for America."



I had never taken a photo before, but the magnificent beauty of our country forced me to try and at least capture some memories of the wonders I saw.

A professional career and family put the marriage of photography and nature on the back burner for about 30 years, until I bought my first digital camera. I never studied photography in any kind of formal way, but the same love of nature that inspired me in my youth, forced me to learn by myself, on the fly, when I started traveling the world with my wife, Lili. I felt compelled to capture the beauties of the world to relive the memories of my experiences and to share with others. The experiences and photos were their own reward, but I was fortunate enough to share them with others, at an exhibition in Chelsea, in NYC, at the Margaret Thatcher Gallery. I also had one of my photos exhibited at the United Nations Convention of Climate Change, in 2014, in Lima, Peru, attended by 197 countries. That photo was the cover photo of a United Nations report that came out of that conference.

The photos that you see are taken from some of the most beautiful places in the world, ranging from its southern reaches of Tierra Del Fuego (South America), and the Cape of Good Hope (Africa), way up to 400 miles north of the Arctic Circle. Included are numerous stops in between, in the Amazon, Africa, Asia, the Middle East, Iceland, Europe, South and Central Americas, and of course the United States.





#### A golf tip from Larry Lutz, Hideout Golf Teaching Pro

A couple of small changes to how you tee up your ball for your driver can have a big impact on how far and straight you hit your drive. Here are two tips to help ensure you are setting up for success.

- 1. Tee the ball up to its equator. Set your driver on the turf and push your tee in until half the ball is above the head (crown) and half is below.
- Line up the ball with your front foot. Your driver is designed to be hit on the up-swing. Move the ball up in your stance so it is lined up with the in-step of your front foot. This will make it easier to hit on the up-swing without making any changes to your swing.

I hope you find this tip helpful, but most of all, remember your good shots, learn from the bad ones, and have fun.

### **Indoor & Outdoor Water Conservation Tips for the Summer Season**

#### INDOOR WATER LEAKS

A leaking pipe or fixture within your home will increase the water usage as measured by your water meter. If you receive a high water bill or notice an increase in usage, we suggest you look at your faucets and toilets to see if a small leak is present. A large amount of water can flow through the meter due to a leaky faucet or toilet.

To check for leaks, look at the red triangle on your water meter at a time when you are not running water. If the dial is spinning slowly, there is most likely a small leak. Toilets can be checked for leaks by placing a few drops of food coloring into the water hold tank and seeing if any color seeps into the toilet bowl. You should also try to shut off the water supply to the toilet and see if the red triangle on the water meter stops spinning.

If you will be away from the home for a while, note the reading on your water meter before you leave, then check it again when you return to see if the reading has changed. Fixing these leaks will save both water and money.

#### SAVE WATER INDOORS

#### **Toilets**

If your toilet is not a low-flow model, you can install a watersaving displacement device in the tank to reduce the amount of water needed to flush. Flush only when necessary.

#### Washing Clothes

Match your washer's water level to your load size. Repair any leaks from faucets, hose connections, or pipes. Look for waterefficient models when purchasing a new machine.

#### Showers and Sinks

Try a faucet aerator on your sink to reduce water while maintaining flow. Take shallow baths. Keep showers short and use a low flow showerhead. A flow restrictor lets you maintain the faucet setting and shut off water at the showerhead while soaping or shampooing.

#### Doing Dishes

When you wash dishes by hand, use basins rather than running water. Soak pots and pans before washing. If you use a dishwasher, run only full loads and avoid extra cycles.

#### Preparing Food

Thaw frozen food in your refrigerator. Wash food in a basin, not under the tap.

#### **OUTDOOR WATER LEAKS**

The water service line to your home may develop a leak, and this will not show up as usage on your meter. Underground leaks do not always show up as a stream of flowing water on the surface. If you notice a puddle that doesn't go away in dry weather or an area that has become soft and squishy compared to the surrounding area, then that could indicate a leak in the water service line.

An underground water leak can cause significant damage to your home and property if it is not addressed and wasting water ends up costing all of us in the end, so please contact us immediately if you suspect a leak is present.

While a large water main break can sometime be very obvious, water leaks are not always that easy to find. Water leaking in a toilet, in a yard, or under a street may go undetected for a long time and waste a vast amount of water. Our personnel search for suspected leaks, but sometimes they notice signs of a water leak while doing other tasks or even just driving to work. By following the tips below, you can help find leaks yourself, which can save you money, prevent damage to your property, and help conserve our vital drinking water.

#### SAVE WATER OUTDOORS

Driveways, Sidewalks, and Walkways

Instead of the hose, use a broom or leaf blower to remove dead leaves and other debris.

Hoses and Faucets
Repair all leaks and install a water-saving shutoff nozzle that can be adjusted to fit the task at hand.

Landscaping

Minimize lawn space and plant drought-tolerant natives.

Your Vehicle

Wash your vehicle at a car wash so the water can be properly recycled. The help and cooperation of every resident is critical to preserving the Hideout water supply. RS&W sincerely appreciates your conservation efforts through this critical time. Thank

Help Protect Water Quality

Many of our water supplies are threatened by contaminants. Here's how you can help protect the quality of your supply: Around the House

Look for nontoxic alternatives for household products, and properly use and store all toxic products, including cleaners, solvents, and paints. Take unwanted pharmaceuticals and household hazardous materials to a local collection site for disposal

in the Garden

Switch from garden chemicals to nontoxic alternatives. Use chemicals carefully and sparingly in accordance with labels and dispose of them at a collection center. Use a broom or rake rather than a hose to clean up garden clippings. Your Vehicles

Take used motor oil and antifreeze to a proper collection center. Have your vehicle inspected and maintained regularly to reduce leakage of oil, antifreeze, and other fluids. Wash your car at a car wash so the water can be properly recycled.

In the Kitchen Compost food waste when possible. Putting food waste, oils, and grease down the drain burdens wastewater treatment plants and affects aquatic life and water quality downstream. Please help us protect this vital resource!

#### REMEMBER WHEN

### Who remembers these three initials . . . ABH!

Who remembers the slogan . . . ABH truly is the Heart of the Community.

The Association For A
Better Hideout (ABH) was
formed in 1988 and had a
small group of members.
The objective of ABH was
to establish and develop a
community awareness of
all policies, functions, and
activities that affect the
Hideout. It provided a
forum for all residents to
channel their suggestions
and complaints to be sent
to the Board of Directors
with the backing of the ABH

rather than an individual. Back in the 1990's Hideout Board of Director meetings were not open to the membership, but thanks to the ABH those meetings were now well attended. Their voices were being heard, but little did they know how much their organization would benefit the Hideout in so many other ways.

ABH meetings were held once a month and guests were often brought in to inform the members on various topics such as: Estate Planning, Long Term Care, the Probate Process, Senior Housing, Lifeline (a personal response and support service), Medical Alert Dogs, to name just a few. ABH also realized that they had to get local politicians involved with the Hideout community, to listen to their concerns, so politicans were invited to speak and listen. During one of these meetings, Mr. Jerry Peet, an emergency response coordinator, member of Hamlin Fire & Rescue, and founder of the Hideout Emergency Response Team, who was invited by the ABH to speak, pointed out the need for life-saving equipment and training to service the Hideout membership and the surrounding area. He noticed that there was a major lapse in time between the time of the emergency call and arrival of personnel on the scene, and that something had to be done.

Betty Sullivan, Virginia Sabia, and all of ABH started the process of raising funds to help Hamlin Ambulance get a defibrillator. Members could be found everywhere in the Hideout spreading the message. It took a year, but they raised enough money (over \$10,000) to purchase a defibrillator for Hamlin Fire & Rescue and two small AED's for the Hideout's Public Safety Department. The purpose of the donations was to get the lifesaving help of a defibrillator to heart patients in The Hideout and surrounding areas quickly. Also donated was a simulator for Hamlin Ambulance personnel and training equipment for use at the Hideout. ABH also secured a doctor, Dr. George, from Wayne Memorial Hospital to be the Doctor on record for all the defibrillators, and he also trained and monitored the program. Also purchased were beepers, jumpsuits, and bags for our Public Safety Officers and also a third defibrillator.

The Hideout, because of ABH was the first community to ever have EMT's, defibrillators, and small AED's. In 1997, a Hideout resident was the first person whose life was saved. Lake Wallenpaupack followed our example and started their own Emergency Response Team. ABH President Betty Sullivan and Vice President Don Snyder traveled to a community in North Carolina and helped them organize a similar group. Virginia Sabia who was on the Hideout Budget Committee established a line item for the EMT's in the Hideout budget, so that there would always be funds for the Emergency Response Team and to help keep their equipment up-to-date. ABH was so successful that at their 13-year anniversary in 2001, they were 110 members strong. Betty Sullivan was the only president that served ABH, and Ed Roessler, Don Snyder, and Tony Sabia served as Vice Presidents. In 2005, after 18 years of service to the Hideout, the group dissolved. They had accomplished all that they had set out to do, and most importantly they cared for their Hideout neighbors and surrounding community.

#### <u>ABH CARE</u>

ABH Care was part of the Association for a Better Hideout and was formed in 1992 by Gordon DuBuque. Gordon, who was legally blind, came to the ABH to request that they form a care unit to help people by offering volunteer assistance to their fellow neighbors in cases of emergencies. There were 95+ volunteers who volunteered to go out on emergency calls, pick up residents from the hospital, to see a doctor or pick up a prescription, and other assorted emergency errands, and our volunteers did this with no compensation whatsoever. There was also a health equipment closet on site in the Hideout to provide at no cost, needed medical equipment such as hospital beds, wheelchairs, crutches, etc. when needed. Have you noticed the Wayne County Transportation vans in the Hideout? Thanks to ABH Care and Betty Sullivan's participation with the Area of Aging for getting this much needed service for our Hideout residents. ABH Care also received the Human Services Award from the Pocono Northeast Community Awards Program in 1993. ABH Care brought a sense of community to the Hideout since its beginning. Neighbors helping neighbors!

# **Shrimp and asparagus:** A lovely combo

It was the favorite vegetable of Julius Caesar, King Louis the XIV, and Thomas Jefferson. But the history of asparagus begins long before that. The name comes from a Greek word meaning stalk or shoot. The Romans borrowed asparagus from the Greeks and cultivated it in every land they visited.

Asparagus is a member of the lily family and is related to onions, leeks, and garlic. It contains more cancer-fighting glutathione than any other food. It is packed with folic acid, which helps to prevent birth defects and heart disease, and it's a good source



of potassium, fiber, vitamins A, D, B6, and thiamin. And it is rich in rutin, which helps strengthen blood vessels.

Health-conscious dieters will be pleased to know that asparagus contains no fat and no cholesterol. It's low in sodium, and contains only 20 calories per serving.

Under ideal conditions, it can grow up to 10 inches in a day and reach up to 12 feet in height. The best asparagus has firm, fresh stalks with tightly closed tips. Because its folate is destroyed by exposure to air, heat, or light, it is best to store it in the back of the refrigerator or in a produce drawer.

Microwaving destroys fewer of its nutrients than boiling or steaming. Cook it upright in a tall container with a few inches of water in the pot. Simmer 5 to 7 minutes with the tips

## Orange-Soy asparagus sauce

Combine 1 tablespoon each of soy sauce and fresh orange juice with 1/2 teaspoon grated orange rind, grated ginger, and dark sesame oil. Stir in 2 shallots or 1 small onion, minced. Drizzle over cooked asparagus and toss to coat.

Shrimp and asparagus - Perfect for low carb diets, shrimp has no carbs and asparagus has 5 carbs per cup. Lemon juice has 5 carbs per 1/4 cup.

Prepare this lemon sauce for the dish and set aside. Combine in small bowl:

2/3 cup chicken stock

- 1 tablespoon cornstarch
- 1 tablespoon soy sauce
- 1/4 cup lemon juice

Add a tablespoon of sugar, if you desire.

Stir fry shrimp in olive oil, 1 teaspoon minced garlic and 1 teaspoon ginger until shrimp is pink. Remove. Using the same pan, add asparagus, cooking until bright and tendercrisp. Bring asparagus and shrimp together in same pan. Pour lemon sauce mixture over shrimp and asparagus. Simmer for a minute to thicken sauce. Serve.

If carbs are not an issue, add rice or noodles.


#### LOT NUMBER SIGN POST

MAINTAIN YOUR SIGN POST IN GOOD CONDITION. First Responders (Fire, EMT, etc.) need to find you as quickly as possible in an Emergency!

ALL LOTS in the Hideout are required to have an emergency post. Numbers must be visible in poor lighting conditions. Additional personal signs are OK, but should not block the numbers

Your EMERGENCY SIGN POST is an important item that may need some needed maintenance before the summer season. Most of these are wood posts, which should display BOTH the Lot Number and the Emergency Number. Numbers must be displayed on both sides of the post. You may not realize how important this simple inexpensive item is until you experience an emergency situation. First Responders need to find you as fast as possible!

ALL Developed LOTS in the Hideout are required to have an emergency post. Numbers must be visible in poor lighting conditions. Don't know your "emergency number"? Call the Main Office 698-1400 x166 or x102. Reflective number stickers (free) can be obtained at the Rt 590 Main Gate - Public Safety Office.

## Credit card bonuses: Bigger yet out of reach

# **ENVIRONMENTAL REMINDERS**

#### **RECYCLING**

Recycling is open Monday - Sunday 24/7

The Maintenance Department accepts Bulk Items Monday - Friday at the Maintenance Shop between 11:30 a.m. - 12 noon, Saturday morning by appointment only, (570) 698-4100, ext. 133. (fees apply)

No electronics accepted, i.e., computers, televisions, refrigerators, air conditioners, dehumidifiers, etc. Also not accepted are tires, paints, thinners, oils, etc.

#### **COMMINGLED RECYCLING**

Single stream (also known as "fully commingled" or "single-sort") recycling refers to a system in which all paper fibers, plastics, metals, and other containers are mixed in a collection truck, instead of being sorted by the depositor into separate commodities (newspaper, paperboard, Corrugated fiberboard, plastic, glass, etc.) and handled separately throughout the collection process. In single stream, both the collection and processing systems are designed to handle this fully commingled mixture of recyclables, with materials being separated for reuse at a materials recovery facility.

#### **TREES**

What To Do If A Tree Is About To Fall From One Lot To Another?

Even though the Hideout has an easement between properties, this matter is strictly between the parties involved. This includes limbs, branches and trees. If you have this situation, notify the property owner whose property presents the hazard.

The Hideout does not provide information relative to the Membership. You should call the Wayne County Tax Assessment Office at (570) 253-5970 or the internet at taxassessment officewaynecountypennsylvania.com. You should also contact your insurance company. Another resource is the internet for the purpose of researching Pennsylvania Real Estate Law on the subject. Again, this is a civil matter between the parties involved and cannot be resolved by the Hideout.

Note: In the event that the tree is on Hideout Common Property, the Land & Environmental Planning Manager should be notified so that the appropriate action can be taken to remove the hazard.

#### **PROPANE TANKS**

Safety Guidelines For Propane Tanks: Homeowners who decide to install a propane tank on their property need to be aware of the new guidelines for such. A Propane Permit is needed. The National

Fire Protection Agency (NFPA) has established a set of rules that govern the requirements for the clearance around propane tanks in the NFPA 58 Liquefied Petroleum Gas Code. Size of the clearance radius will depend on type of installation and the size of the tank.

Vertical Tanks - The requirements for the clearance around vertical propane tanks under 125 gallons depends on the location of ignition sources, venting windows and doors. The tank itself may be placed against the house or building, but it has to be at least ten (10) feet from an ignition source such as a water heater and three (3) feet from a venting window or door.

#### **Horizontal Tanks**

 Horizontal tanks, also referred to as vessels, come in three main sizes: 330,



550 and 1,000 gallons. The size of the vessel normally depends on the propane requirements and the size of the structure using the fuel. The requirements for the clearance around the 330 and the 550 gallon propane tanks are at least ten (10) feet from the structure. Ten (10) feet from the property line and ten (10) feet from any ignition source. The 1,000 gallon propane tank requires at least twenty five (25) feet of clearance from the structure, the property line and any ignition sources.

Also, be aware that according to our Protective Covenants and ECC Manual, every fuel storage tank on any lot shall be either buried below ground or screened to the satisfaction of the Committee.

Please remember that if you apply for a permit, it is not automatically given. There is a process, which could take up to two (2) weeks.

The ECC has to review the application and then a permit is approved or denied. If you have been denied, the Hideout will send you a letter with the reason(s) why it was not approved. You can then make the corrections and it will be reviewed again at the next meeting. Also, remember that nearly everything you do outside of your home requires a permit. Please pick up your permits at the POA Office. When your project is complete, sign and return your permit to the POA.

#### MEMBERS AND **CONTRACTORS**

Among the items that the Environmental Control Committee will look for when going over your application is an "As Built" survey. There are several reasons for this:

- To be sure of the placement of any structures on your property.
- · To be sure of setback lines. When turning in an application for any of the below permits, you must have an "as built" survey. • Garages (both detached and attached) • Decks • Driveways
- · Sheds · Additions · Dock/Bulkhead Gazebo, Patio, Sunroom • Major Landscaping. This survey will be marked as "existing" not proposed. If you have any questions, please call Fran at DON'T

#### **HIDEOUT DOG PARK** REGISTRATION

Bring proof of Rabies and Distemper Shots from your Veterinarian to the Registration Department at the POA. Vet forms must indicate that males are neutered. You will be asked to complete a Hideout Pet Registration Form. The Dog Park Registration section of the form is optional for members wishing to join the Dog Park. Registration will file copies of your documents, collect the \$15 annual fee and issue a Dog Collar Tag authorizing membership and admission to the Dog Park. Your pets must be registered even if you are not applying for Dog Park membership-however, there is no fee unless you are joining the Dog Park. The Dog Park Tag must be affixed to your dog's collar prior to entry to the Park. Note that a current amenity badge must also be carried in the Park at all times.

Dog Park Regulations - You must pick up after your dog. Owners ignoring this rule will be asked to leave and be denied future entry. Mutt mitts for waste disposal pick-up are available. Used Mitts must be placed in Trash containers. Aggressive dogs are not allowed and must be removed immediately. Each car must display a current Hideout Membership/visitor sticker on their vehicle. Each dog must display a Collar Tag issued by the Dog Park Committee indicating Veterinary Certification that each male dog is neutered and has a current immunization for: Rabies and Distemper. Female dogs in heat are not allowed in Park. Children under age of 12 may attend only under supervision of an adult and adult must be supervising the dog. Members may supervise no more than two dogs per adult. Hours of operation are posted. The Park is self policing and dog owners using Park enforce these rules. Small dogs are free to use the Small Dog Area & all areas of the Park. Large dogs must be kept out of the Small Dog Area.

#### HIDEOUT PET REGULATIONS



responsibility of the owner of the pet to clean up and remove animal excrement of Dogs are only allowed at the Dog Park and

on the Walking Trail and must be registered with the POA. Please note, roads are not considered an amenity.

All Pet complaints are processed via the Hideout North Gate Control Center. The owner may be subjected to fines and or sanctions depending on the violation. In addition, the Wayne County Dog Warden has jurisdiction and will respond to animal complaints and take the appropriate action as deemed necessary. Pet regulations are in place for the protection of residents and guests and the ultimate goal is to seek voluntary compliance on the part of the membership.

#### **WILDLIFE**



In support of our community's wildlife management efforts and to reduce the need for future culls, that the feeding of any wildlife (with the exception of birds) within The Hideout is prohibited and is subject to an initial Citation and Fine in the amount of \$1,000.00.

Anyone who chooses to feed birds can do so only if they use a bird feeder(s) unit that is kept at a minimum height of eight (8) feet above ground level, if not they will also be subject to a Citation and a \$1,000.00 fine. 



# So You Wanna Sell Your Home? Step 7: Get Ready to Close

Hooray! You've found a buyer for your home. You're done, right? Right?

Not quite. All you have to do now is get yourself—and your house—ready to close, and we're here to help.

#### **Earnest money**

When the buyer makes an offer on your house and you accept, the buyer will write a check for a deposit known as *earnest money*. Everyone at some point gets a bit puzzled by earnest money. It comes down to a simple idea: This is money you put forward that proves that you are earnest about your intentions to move forward on the deal. These funds are held by a third party (usually the seller's agency) until you close the deal.

If the deal goes through, the earnest money becomes part of the buyer's down payment (or full cash payment). If the deal falls through because you're unable to meet the buyer's <u>contingencies</u> (for example with the inspection or appraisal), that money gets returned to the buyer. Usually. However, if <u>buyers back out</u> just because they randomly change their mind, you may get to keep that money for all the hassle—consider it a hefty consolation prize for having to put your home back on the market.

#### The inspection

Unless you've sold the home "as is" (and sometimes even if you have), the buyer will want an inspection on the home. The inspector's job is to look for problems like:

- Roof damage
- Structural problems
- Plumbing problems
- Fire hazards like bad wiring or improperly working chimneys
- Major appliance and HVAC issues

Since the buyers hire the inspector, the report will go to them...however you may be entitled to see the full report. If they spot anything amiss, trust us, you will hear about it, as it may become a negotiation point you'll have to work out before you close.

#### The appraisal

If your buyers are getting a mortgage, they will also have to hire an appraiser. If the buyer is paying cash, they may include an appraisal contingency. An appraiser is similar to an inspector, in that they come to your house and check it out, top to bottom. Only the purpose is different: Rather than looking for problems and repairs, an appraiser is trying to estimate what your home is worth, so that the lender knows the investment is sound. To do that, the appraiser will not only size up your home in person but check out the sale prices of comparable houses in your neighborhood (much as a Realtor would do for you). If the appraiser's price matches the one your buyers are paying (or even if it's higher), all is good.

But if the appraisal comes back *lower* than the asking price, it may become a problem. Typically, lenders won't loan buyers anything above the appraisal amount. The buyers have two choices: Pay cash for the difference, or negotiate a lower sale price with you. If they choose the latter, you've got two choices, too: Accept the lower home price, or walk. To decide, ask yourself: How easy would it be to find a new buyer? If you were deluged with offers, it may be in your interests to move on, but keep in mind that you might run into the same problem with subsequent appraisals. So unless you're confident your home is worth more and you're willing to head back to square one, you may want to take a hit just to keep moving forward.

Next up? The close. Hallelujah! We'll tell you what you need to know about that next time.

frequency sounds you have been missing. Your hearing aids are giving these sounds back to you. This may be bothersome at first, but better understanding comes from letting you hear them. Be patient while your brain gets reacquainted with these sounds. At first, your voice may sound strange to you. Some wearers say that in the beginning

they sound like they are in a barrel. In time, it will sound natural.

Background noise is normal. Normal-hearing people hear it, too. Don't give up on hearing aids because noise bothers you. Better hearing will require you to put up with a few inconveniences.

Buying hearing aids won't give you instant gratification. There is a learning curve, which usually takes from six weeks to six months. Success comes from practice and a commitment to wear them all your waking hours. If you purchase a custom hearing instrument, designed to fit your ear, you will likely need to have some adjustments to make it a better fit. Stick with it. You will succeed.

Should your hearing aids ever stop working, do not be alarmed. This is normal. The inner ear canal is 100 percent humidity and remains a constant 98 degrees. Earwax is a combination of salt and corrosive body acid. These conditions are harmful to electronics, but it is in this environment that hearing aids must perform. You will need to bring them in for routine professional care.

#### THE REWARDS FOR STICKING WITH THE PLAN ARE TRULY WORTH THE EFFORT


There is a common discipline followed by all men and women who successfully make the transition to hearing aids. It is called practice. It is an investment that will cost you time and patience. It is an investment that usually begins to pay dividends with 45 days Once you have logged the sufficient number of hours for our brain to re-acclimate to ambient sounds, you will be able to go on with your life without thinking so much about

While we encourage new users to start at a slow pace at home, your ultimate goal should be to use your hearing aids all day, every day. This includes times when it is quiet, times when it is noisy, and times when you may think you don't need to be wearing them. Unless your hearing aids become part of your habit through daily use, your brain will not be stimulated long enough to learn to interpret the true sounds of your world.

After you have completed your initial week to two weeks of gradual hearing aid use, you should put your hearing aids on first thing when you wake up and take them out at bedtime. It is a mistake to only wear them when you go out to social functions because your brain will be flooded and startled by unfamiliar ambient sounds. Be patient and don't give up. Retreat temporarily if you become tired, but don't quit.

Keep working – it will become easy. We strongly encourage anyone who is concerned about their hearing to seek

professional advice and have a comprehensive hearing exam.

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




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# Thomas Jefferson's First Inaugural Address, 1801

A rising nation spread over a wide and fruitful land, traversing all the seas with the rich productions of their industry, engaged in commerce with nations who feel power, and forget right, advancing rapidly to destinies beyond the reach of the mortal eye. When I contemplate these transcendent objects, & see the honor the happiness, & the hopes of this beloved country committed to the issue & the auspices of this day, I shrink from the contemplation, & humble myself before the magnitude of the undertaking.

# Abraham Lincoln's Inaugural Address, 1865

With malice toward none; with charity for all; with firmness in the right, as God gives us to see the right, let us drive to finish the work we are in; to bind up the nation's wounds, to care for him who shall have borne the battle, and for his widow, and his orphans to do all which may achieve and cherish a just and lasting peace, among ourselves, and with all nations.



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
